

## KEY FACTS ABOUT SHINGLES

- Shingles is the reactivation of the varicella zoster virus, the same virus that causes chickenpox. It is most common in people over 50 years of age<sup>1-4</sup>
- Nearly all adults 50 years and older already carry the inactive virus that causes shingles<sup>1-4</sup>
- About 1 in 3 people will develop shingles in their lifetime regardless of how healthy they may feel<sup>1-4</sup>
- Shingles typically produces a painful, blistering rash<sup>1-4</sup>
- Whilst most people recover fully, shingles can put you at risk of suffering from long-term painful and debilitating complications<sup>1-3</sup>

## SHINGLES CAN AFFECT EVERY PART OF YOUR LIFE

Shingles can not only be painful, it can also impact your social and emotional wellbeing, your work and even your ability to carry out everyday activities.
